Moral Development

Moral development refers to the students' knowledge, understanding, intentions, attitudes and behaviour in relation to what is right and wrong. The

The government set out its definition of British values in the 2011 Prevent Strategy. The four key British Values are:

Democracy The rule of law Individual liberty Mutual respect and tolerance of those of different faiths and belief

Students will have:

An understanding of how citizens can influence decision-making through the democratic process An appreciation that living under the rule of law protects individual citizens and is essential for their wellbeing and safety

An understanding that there is a separation of power between the executive and the judiciary, and that while public bodies such as the police and the army can be held to account through Parliament, others such as the courts maintain independence

An understanding that the freedom to choose and hold other faiths and beliefs is protected in law An acceptance that other people having different faiths (including none) or beliefs to oneself should be accepted and tolerated, and should not be the cause of prejudicial or discriminatory behaviour; and An understanding of the importance of identifying and combating discrimination

This will be delivered through:

Including in suitable parts of the curriculum - as appropriate for the age of students - material on the strengths, advantages and disadvantages of democracy, and how democracy and the law works in Britain, in contrast to other forms of government in other countries

Ensuring all students within the school have a voice that is listened to, and demonstrate how democracy works by actively promoting democratic processes such as a school council whose members are voted for by the students. Student Council and Student Voice - allowing students' opinions to be heard through democracy and providing an opportunity for leadership

Using opportunities such as general or local elections to hold mock elections to promote fundamental British values and provide students with the opportunity to learn how to argue and defend points of view The role of extra-curricular activities, including any run directly by students, in promoting fundamental
